[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

I do with the advice of Council hereby certify that John Wright, who served as a Soldier in the Regiment of Militia, belonging to this Commonwealth, Commanded by Colonel Charles Lynch, and who was dangerously wounded at the battle of Guilford Courthouse [March 15, 1781], is put on the List of Pensioners with an allowance of twelve pounds per annum commencing the 5th day of December 1793 according to law.

Given under my hand as Governor of the Commonwealth of Virginia at Richmond this 17th day of December 1794.

Know all men by these presents that I John Wright of Bedford County do hereby Constitute and appoint Captain Thomas Lumpkins, my lawful attorney for the express purpose of receiving of the Treasurer of this Commonwealth fifteen pounds which was granted to me as a pensioner for my present relief, by the General Assembly of Virginia & I do by these presents authorize & empower the said Thomas Lumpkins in my name & for my use to receive of the said treasurer of Virginia the said sum of fifteen pounds. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 27th day of June 1794.

He served in Colonel Lynch's Regiment of Militia the time he was disabled and that he now resides in the state of Virginia and County of Bedford, and has resided there for the last fifty-six years – previous to which time he resided in the County of Goochland. He was in the militia under Colonel Charles Lynch. He was dangerously wounded at the battle of Guilford by a musket ball which fractured the bones of his head and occasioned and exfoliation. He had a wife and 5 small children. He received £15 relief and a pension of £12 per annum on 5 December 1793."]
