Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been ormitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." [Note: The widow evidently lived in Sussex County Virginia as the annual authorization, appropriation, disbursement and receipt for the pension was administered through the Sussex County court. The papers in the file indicate that the widow continued to receive her pension through October 23, 1809 at which time John Tyler, Governor of the state of Virginia authorized the renew will of the pension.]
