[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]



John Slaughter of the County of York came before me William Coleman magistrate for the City of Williamsburg and made oath on the holy Evangelist of Almighty God. That he was a Soldier during three years of the Revolutionary War, and served in the 1st Virginia Regiment of Cavalry at 1st commanded by Col. Bland [Theodoric Bland], then by Col. Temple [Benjamin Temple], and at the time of his discharge by Col. White [Anthony Walton White]; that during all the time of his service he belonged to the company of Capt. Thomas Pemberton.

That it was about the 5th day of July in the year 1778 when he enlisted, and was discharged after having performed the three years of duty for which he had enlisted on or about the 5th day of July 1781. That he was promised when he enlisted for the three years service besides his regular pay, a bounty of one hundred Acres of land; and which was in so little estimation at the time of his discharge that he was told it would cost him five shillings and three pence to get his title papers printed &c and at the same time he was only offered one dollar for it by those persons who were purchasing soldiers' lands. That from these causes he did not get his land warrant for the Bounty to which he was entitled, not having applied for the same: and he was further told, that those then purchasing soldiers' land that the land were then in the possession of the Indians and that they would be to be fought for, before they can be obtained. The said Slaughter further states that he was discharged at Raccoon Ford in this State after his time of service expired and received his regular discharge signed as he supposes by the proper officer; that some two or three years thereafter or more he unluckily lost out of his pocket on the road between Richmond and the new Bridge his Pocket Book in which was his certificate of discharge and also his certificate for balance of pay to the amount of one hundred pounds, which he has totally lost, never having gotten the same renewed: and he is uninformed whether the certificate was ever found, and whether any application by was anyone that has been made for payment of it from the State. On the certificate he had drawn interest, nearly up to the time he lost it. The said Slaughter further states that since the time of his discharge, he had not applied for the bounty land because he did not know that he would be permitted to draw it having lost his certificate of discharge & he was informed that Capt. Pemberton under whom he had served had some years past removed into the Western Country but what part of it this deponent is not informed & he supposes that it would be essentially necessary to the success of any application he was to make, that it should be accompanied with a certificate from Capt. Pemberton, of the time of his service and regular discharge.

He now prays that he may be permitted to receive his bounty of Land.

The said Slaughter he found in the company when he enlisted, and he was discharged not long before this deponent was himself discharged--and therefore he thinks the foregoing statement of service made by the said Slaughter is correct and true.
