## American Revolution

This is to certify James Collier Served three years in the Second Virginia Rigement as a soldier and then reinlisted for the war & was killed at Blufords defeat [defeat of Col Abraham Buford at the Battle of Waxhaws SC, 29 May 1780]. Given under my Hand this 21 day of April 1813.

John hisXmark Collier

King & Queen County Sc

John Collier appeared before me a Justice of the peace and made oath to the above Certificate Given from under my hand this 21<sup>th</sup> day of April 1818 John Waller

FOR apprehending the following deserters belonging to the *Virginia* state garrison regiment of infantry now stationed near *Williamsburg*, *Thomas Tisdale*, a *Virginian*, born in *Hanover* county, about 23 years old, 5 feet 8 inches high, brown complexion, brown hair, black eyes, had on when he went away a blue regimental coat turned up with red, a red jacket and breeches. *Charles Valentine*, a mulatto, born in *Surry* county, *Virginia*, 28 years old, 5 feet 9 inches high, well made, had on the same uniform as above. *James Collier a Virginian*, born in *King & Queen* county, 16 years of age, 5 feet 2½ inches high, fair complexion, light hair, blue eyes, and well made, had on same uniform as above. *John Bunns*, a *Virginian*, born in *King & Queen* county, 16 years old, 5 feet 2 inches high, light eyes and brown hair, with the same uniform as above. Whoever apprehends the said deserters, and conveys them to the commanding officer at *Williamsburg, York, Hampton*, or *Portsmouth*, shall have the above reward, or 20 dollars for either of them.

Given under my hand at head quarters Williamsburg, March 13, 1779.
