## Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements and Rosters

Virginia documents pertaining to William Dix VAS3382

[The following are from bounty-land records in the Library of Virginia.]

Accomack county, Virginia, 13th Mar. 1816.

I do hereby certify that William Dix, formerly of this county, enlisted a soldier in the ninth Virginia regiment of regulars, on Continental establishment, that he was taken prisoner the 4<sup>th</sup> of October 1777; that he was a Serjeant, a brave man, and that he was honorably discharged after serving three years faithfully.

formerly Lt. Colo. Comm'dant. 11 Virg'a Regim't.

At a Court held for Accomack County on the 27 day of January 1823.

The deposition of Robert Russell [W5753] now upwards of Sixty years who being first duly Sworn deposeth and saith that William Dix served in the Revolutionary war to his knowledge from the time of his enlistment which was in the early part of the year 1776 and that he served in the 9<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment untill the Battle of German Town [Germantown, 4 Oct 1777] at which Battle the said Russell and Dix were taken prisoners and that they Continued in prison together untill the next July after said battle when the deponent was Carried to New york [Clerk's certification undeciphered]

One the 24<sup>th</sup> Jany. 1817 Wm Dix was allowed 100 acres as a private when the papers shewes him to be a Sergeant; he prays that his claim be reconsidered & that he be allowed the bounty of a Sergeant
