This is to certify that Henry Dogan enlisted into the Continental Virginia Line in the service of the United States of America the last day of October 1776 to serve as a soldier for three years & which time he served and was discharged the 2<sup>d</sup> day of Novr 1779 Given under my hand Octob'r 16<sup>th</sup> 1783

[The following are from rejected claims in the Library of Virginia.]

To His Excellency the Governor and Council of the State of Virginia.

The Petition of William H. Dogan, Elizabeth Dogan, John D. Dogan, Hariet Beedle Widow of — Beedle who was Hariet Dogan, and Jane M Howeson, who was Jane Dogan. Humbly sheweth, that they are the sons and Daughters of Henry Dogan deceased, a revolutionary Soldier, who enlisted in the Summer of 1776 in the County of Prince William State of Virginia, in a Company commanded by Capt. Jesse Davis [W8652], and marching from the Town of Dumfries in said County joined a Regiment in Baltimore, and proceeding on to the North, joined the grand army, and was in the Battles of Brandy-Wine [Brandywine, 11 Sep 1777], German Town [Germantown, 4 Oct 1777], and Monmouth [28 Jun 1779], and after serving the full term of his enlistment being three years was discharged in the summer of 1779. His discharge they have never seen, nor do they know what has become of it; but the evidence of his said service, will be found in the Virginia Roll of the Army. The said Henry Dogan never having received from the State of Virginia the Bounty Land given to Soldiers who served for three years, Your Petitioners are advised that they will be entitled to, as his only children and heirs at Law.

They therefore humbly pray, That a Warrant may be issued for the same in their behalf, and they as in duty bound shall ever pray &c.
