Virginia – Gloucester County [22 May 1832]

The affidavit of William H. Dunston taken before Peter W. Billups and Robert C. Custis, two of the Commonwealths Justices of the peace for Gloucester County.

Gloucester County to Wit

The affidavit of Almon Dunston [W731] a Soldier in the Revolutionary war taken before me a Justice of the peace for the County aforesaid. This aff'nt Saith that he was well acquainted with Warner Dunston a Soldier in the Revolutionary war, that he served in the same company with this affiant in the Virginia State Line, that he was in the battles at Monmouth Court House [28 Jun 1778] & at the taking of Stoney point [Stony Point, 16 Jul 1779] & that he served three years in Succession that He fought Bravely & was Honourably discharged as witness my hand and seal this 2nd day July 1832

It appearing by the Register of certificates issued to Officers and soldiers of the Revolutionary war for the balances of their full pay or depreciation according to the Act of November session 1781 that a certificate issued to the 4th July 1783 to Warner Dunston a Soldier of infantry in the State line for £57.7.9 which certificate was issued to John Shackleford.
