Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements and Rosters

Virginia documents pertaining to John Logan and William Logan VAS3959 Transcribed and annotated by C. Leon Harris.

[From bounty-land records in the Library of Virginia.]

I Christian Horice of the County of Nansemond and State of Virginia, aged Seventy-two years, (born 14th July 1761) do hereby certify that I was well acquainted with William Logan and John Logan during the period of the Revolutionary War; that the said William & John Logan lived with their father about one mile from my father's where I lived during the revolutionary war; that the said William and John Logan enlisted in the regular army of United States in the town of Portsmouth, Virginia; that William Logan enlisted for three years, and John enlisted for during the war, and I think it was about the year 1780 about twelve months after Suffolk was burnt [13 May 1779]; that they both came home to see their father just before they marched away and that William told his father he was a sergeant, and John said he was nothing but a private; that they both said they would rather join the regular service; that they fared[?] better there than they had done in the militia; and that I have always heard & understood that they served their time out faithfully and that they had both received an honorable discharge. Sworn to & subscribed this 16th day of November 1833.
