State of Kentucky ss } Personally appeared before me the subscriber a Justice of the Peace in Jefferson County and for said County Joseph Saunders who being duly sworn saith that he } is now seventy two years of age that he enlisted early in September 1775 in Capt John Greens [John Green BLWt866-500] company of the first Virginia State Regiment commanded by Col [Patrick] Henry. That at a subsequent Period he was appointed an Ensign in the said first Regiment at that time commanded by Col George Gibson [BLWt1985-500] that he served as ensign aforesaid in said regiment untill the [blank] year 1777 when he resigned at [undeciphered] in the state of Pennsylvania and returned home to Virginia that in the year 1779 he was appointed a Lieutenant and stationed part of the time at Charlottesville to guard the British Prisioners and afterwards was a Leut. in Captain Major George Slaughters [George Slaughter W8729] Company and Battallion and attached to Col Crockets [Joseph Crockett S46377] Regiment and served as Lieutenant aforesaid in said regiment untill the end of the war. That he was paid his monthly wages as disposed of the same up to the last of December 1781 but to no later date or period that he never resigned his appointment or commission a second time but was at all times in readiness to obey any orders untill the termination of said war and further he saith not

State of Kentucky } Personally appeared before me the subscriber a Justice of the Peace in and for Franklin County } said County Benjamin Roberts [S31343] who being duly sworn saith that he was a Captain in Major George Slaughters corps or Battalion of the Virginia State line in the army of the Revolution and attached to Col Crockets Regiment that a greater part of the time of his said service & that of the Regiment, Battalion or Corps was at the falls of Ohio [Louisville KY] and he says that Joseph Saunders was a Lieutenant of Capt Mark Thomas [R18446] Company of said Slaughters Corps or Battalion and served as such to the close of the war or untill the disbanding of the army and is as he believes now living in Jefferson or Bullit County in said State and further he saith not
