## Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements and Rosters

Virginia documents pertaining to Isaac Sterling VAS4481

[From bounty-land records in the Library of Virginia.]

I certify that Richard Cutler who is a credible Witness appeared before me & made oath that Isaac Sterling enlisted in the 9<sup>th</sup> Va Regiment in the time of the Revolutionary War & marched to the north and the Witness thinks in Capt Joynes's [Levin Joynes BLWt1163-500] company, & this affiant understood he joined Washingtons army – that the said Sterling, did not serve all the war but was gone from the County from three to five years as the Witness distinctly recollects & that said Sterling lived near the Witness's fathers house & died in Accomack County, as witness my hand & seal this 15 day of September 1832 at Accomack Co.

I certify that Severn Scott [S38355] a Revolutionary pensioner of the United States & a credible Witness came before me & made oath that he enlisted for & served 2 years in the 9<sup>th</sup> Virginia Regiment in the continental line – that he was discharged with a great number of others at Valley forge in Pennsylvania at the end of the said time – that great exertions were made by the Officers to reinlist the soldiers at that place whose times had just expired & a good many did reinlist, some for 3 years & some for the war – that Isaac Sterling was among those whose term then expired & that said Sterling reinlisted & remained in service, but whether for 3 yrs or for what period the Witness cannot state. Witness my hand & seal at Accomack Coo. this 15 Septr 1832

## To the Gov. & Council

The heirs of Isaac Sterling pray an allowance of Bounty land for said Sterlings services for 3 years on the aforesaid proof.

- 1st Richard Cutlers affidavit proving from 3 to 5 years absence in service
- 2<sup>d</sup> Severn Scotts affidavit proving a reinlistment after serving one tour

By reference to Vol. 9 Henings Statutes at large page 325 it will be seen that the Legislature directed the officers of the 9<sup>th</sup> Va Reg't (in Oct 1777) to use their exertions to reinlist those Soldiers whose terms were about expiring – That Reg't (excepting Blairs [John Blair VAS2518] Company) was raised early in 1776 for 2 years & they were discharged at Valley forge Camp (Pennsylvania) in 1778 & those who were discharged, came home or reinlisted. The afs'd act directs the reinlistment for "3 years or for the war;" Sterling therefore probably reinlisted for 3 yrs as Cutler says he was gone from 3 to 4 years. The 9<sup>th</sup> Reg't was kept in Accomack a long time after it was raised, & probably had not been gone more than 12 months when Sterlings 1<sup>st</sup> time expired.
