I do Certify that Charles Spalding inlisted with me in 1776 to serve in the State Service for Three years or during the War – he was paid up to the last of Jan'y 1777 when he embarked with me on board the Musquito Brig, we were taken prisoners on the 4th of June & I heard that he died about four months afterwards in Barbadoes Goal [Barbados Gaol (Jail)].

I believe that William Spalding is heir to Charles Spalding.

This day Mildred Spalding widow & Relict of John Spalding deced personally appeared before me one of the Justices for the County afores'd & made Oath that William Spalding now residing with her is her eldest Son, that Charles Spalding enlisted in the Service as a Soldier ab't the year 1776. That she has never seen or heard from him since he went to Sea with Capt. Alex'r Dix [sic] that she has heard & believes he is dead, that he had neither wife or Child left no Will that she has ever heard of & that Wm Spalding is his heir. Given under my hand at Caroline County this Sixth Day of March 1785.
