## Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements and Rosters

Virginia documents pertaining to Arthur Teackle VAS4681 Transcribed and annotated by C. Leon Harris.

[From <u>bounty-land records in the Library of Virginia</u>. A certificate by John Robins of Northampton County is mostly illegible.]

I Samuel Waples [W6427] of the county of Accomack, and State of Virginia do hereby certify that I was well acquainted with Arthur Teackle of said county, who joined the Revolutionary War early in the year seventeen hundred and seventy six. Said Arthur Teackle entered the ninth Regiment of Virginia Troops on Continental establishment, as a Lieutenant, and Marched in the latter part of the above mentioned year, under the command of Colo. Thomas Fleming [BLWt409-400] to the northern station beyond Philadelphia where I frequently had an opportunity of seeing him, particularly about the time of the Battle of Brandywine [11 Sep 1777], in which we were both engaged. I recollect perfectly well, that Arthur Teackle was in the Revolutionary service, as above mentioned, several years, and to the best of my recollection, upwards of three years. I never hear'd of his resigning his commission and think it not at all improbable that he served a much long term. I served in the same regiment, a part of my time with Arthur Teackle, and have long since drawn my proportion of Bounty land. Witness my hand this twenty seventh day of January, one thousand, Eight hundred and twenty three.

I certify it appears from a list of such of the names of the officers of the Virginia State line on Continental establishment as received certificates for the balance of their full pay agreeable to the act of assembly passed the November Session 1781 that a certificate issued on the  $27^{th}$  April 1784 in the name of Arthur Teakle for £113.12.8<sup>d</sup> as a Lieutenant J E Heath aud'r
