I Samuel Waddy of the County of Shelby and State of Kentucky do State that I have never received from the State of Virginia nor the United States of America any land bounty on account of services rendered by Samuel Waddy deceased a Soldier of the Revolution Neither did the said Samuel Waddy during his lifetime so far as this Affiant knows or believes and further says not. Given under my hand and seal this 17<sup>th</sup> day of July 1827. Samuel Waddy

## Virginia Sct.

At a Court continued and held for Bedford County at the Courthouse the 21<sup>st</sup> day of August 1827[?]

It appearing to the satisfaction of the Court that Samuel Waddy Junior is the sole heir at law of Samuel Waddy Sen'r a Sergeant of the revolutionary War, the same is ordered to be entered of record.

I Gustavus A. Winfield deputy clerk of the County Court of Bedford do hereby certify that the foregoing is a true copy from the records of said Court.

In testimony whereof I have hereunto subscribed my name and affixed the seal of said Court this 29<sup>th</sup> day of November 18[??] G A Winfield DCBC

The affidavit of Anderson Thomson [S17145] aged about 73 being duly sworn saith that he was a lieutenant in the Virginia continental line engaged in the recruiting service and that sometime in the spring of 1776 he enlisted Samuel Waddy to serve for the term of three years in the Virginia continental line, and the said Waddy was attach'd to the Company commanded by Capt Johnson [possibly Thomas Johnson], third regiment commanded by Colonel [Hugh] Mercer at that time afterwards by Colonel [George] Weedon, this affiant further says that the said Waddy served in the capacity of a Sergeant until the expiration of the time of his enlistment and was honorably discharged. The deponant was a distant relation to the said Samuel Waddy, was well acquainted with him while in service and after his return home until the time of his death which was about one year after he quit[?] the service.
