Bounty Land Warrant information relating to John Stubbs VAS619 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

Petition for bounty land

The Heirs of John Stubbs – midship S. Navy [midshipman state Navy]

In 1777 John Stubbs was a midshipmen on board the *Tempest* – (See the Papers of the *Tempest* in Volume first Navy documents)

There is no proof offered by the Petitioners: and I cannot refer your Excellency to more than is above noted.

Memorandum of Sugar & T for the Officers on Board the ship Tempest

John Stubbs Midshipman one lb Coffee & 6 lbs Sugar

18lbs Sugr 3 lb Coffee 3/20 Tea Same

The above is truly extracted from 2 roles one bearing date 6 September 1779 the other 28 December 1779 to be found in the first volume of papers concerning State Navy

I hereby Certify that I was well acquainted with John Stubbs who was attached to the Virginia Navy of the revolutionary war, I do not Recollect his Grade but believed that he was midshipman on board of the ship Tempest the said John Stubbs entered the service of the Navy the latter part of the year 1776 and was in service when I marched to the South in 1777

To the Govnor and Council of the State of Virginia

The Representatives of John Stubbs respectfully represent that he was a Midshipman in the Navy of Virginia during the War of the Revolution and attached to the Ship Tempest as the evidence filed herewith will shew, that neither he or his representatives have received the Land Bounty promised by Virginia. The evidence shews that he served three years.

Land Bounty has been granted to all the officers of the Tempest except the representatives of George Wray and your petitioners. They pray it may also be granted to them.
