[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Kentucky Scott County Sct.

This day came before me the undersigned a Justice of the Peace for the State and County aforesaid John Vinzant<sup>1</sup> & being first duly sworn on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God states that he was well acquainted with William Lard now deceased, whose heirs or making application for a Land Warrant for revolutionary services. That the said Lard enlisted in the Army of the United States during the revolutionary war against Great Britain. That his enlistment was after the year 1776 & to serve for three years. That his enlistment was in the Virginia line on Continental establishment, and he was in the service three years & was part of the time in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Wm Morgan [William Morgan]<sup>2</sup>. And he further states that said Lard was wounded & taken prisoner at Long Island, and after the lapse of 3 years said Lard died previous to any exchange of him as a prisoner. And I do further certify that the said John Vinzant is a credible witness, well known to me & his statements are entitled to full credit.

Commonwealth of Kentucky Scott Circuit Court Sct. September 5<sup>th</sup>, 1831

"This day came John Vinzant & James Lard, and proved in open Court the death of William Lard; that he left to heirs, James & Betsy Lard; that the said Betsy intermarried with James M. Crist; that she has departed this life, leaving James, Betsy & George Crist together with three other children whose names are not known, as her heirs; and that the said James Lard is yet alive: Can leave is given to take out a copy of this order immediately."

<sup>2</sup> The only William Morgan I could find in the Virginia service was a Lieutenant Colonel in the Berkeley County Virginia militia but was recognized as having served in the Continental line but in what capacity, is not stated.
