Thomas Peay is allowed the sum of twenty-five pounds for his support & family, he having two sons in the Continental Service

Frances Crittendon widow is allowed the sum of thirty-six pounds

Molley Gabey widow is allowed the sum of thirty-six pounds

Nancey Cook [Nancy Cook] widow is allowed the Sum of twenty-four pounds
