[Note: This is a partial list of the veterans and widows of deceased veterans wounded or killed in the Revolutionary War. The South Carolina Legislature awarded pensions to veterans who were wounded while serving in the South Carolina Continental Line, State Troops or Militia during the Revolutionary War as well as to widows whose husbands were killed in action during the Revolutionary War. This list appears to be of pensioners paid by the Columbia branch of the State Treasury with there being another list paid by the Charleston branch of the State Treasury. To date, I've not found the Charleston list, if one exists.]

At the Request of Paul Smith a bombardier and John Polok Junior a Gunner in the Company of Artillery commanded by Captain James Kershaw I do certify that at a General review of the 35th Regiment of Militia & the said Company of Artillery held by order of the Honorable Brigadier General Wynn on the 11th day of June 1799, the said Paul Smith and John Polok, Jr. were very much wounded and burned by the premature Explosion of a piece of Artillery during the performance of the Evolutions. S/ Willis Whitaker, Major 2<sup>nd</sup> Battalion 35<sup>th</sup> Regiment.
