## Mr. Eustis

Dear Sir/ I have Inclos'd. you my Papers in order to get my Land Warrant due me on my Fathers Acc't. as a Serjeant in the Revolutionary War – you will be please to Issue it and Inclose to Mr. H. Bartlet at Millwood Fred'k. Cty. Va. Any Expence thereon will be Remited you by Post Immediately. I am &c March 16<sup>th</sup> 1810 [signed] Charles Cooper

Know all men by these presents that we Samuel Filson & mary Filson (late Mary Cooper and one of the Heirs of Ephraim Cooper Dec'd) wife of the afs'd Samuel Filson both of the County of Fleming and State of Kentucky Have for divers good causes and Considerations unto us moving, and we do by these presents appoint our Trusty Friend Henry Bartlet of the County of Frederick and state of Virginia for us and in our names and for our use to apply at office of the Department of War ask and receive all Land Warrants that we may be entitled to as one of the Heirs and Legal Representatives of the said Ephraim Cooper Dec'd who was a private in the Va. line in the late American Revolution The said Land warrant or Warrants Rec'd to give acquittances therefor in our names. [The rest not transcribed.] Given under our Hand and seals the 9<sup>th</sup> day of August in the year of our Lord 1810

Sir We as the Heirs and legal representatives of the late Ephraim Cooper, deceased request and desire you to hand to the Honble David Trimble Member of Congress now at the City of Washington, the Land warrant which we are entitled to as the heirs of the said Cooper deceased.
