Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." In re: William McIntosh -- War of Revolution.

You are advised that the Revolutionary War records of this Bureau failed to afford information, in regard to any soldier of the Georgia or Troops or residence, named William McIntosh, other than Capt. William McIntosh of the Georgia Continental Line, on account of whose services, 300 acres of bounty land was awarded on warrant No. 1552, which issued April 14, 1799, to John Wright assignee.

There are no papers on file relative to said soldier owing to the destruction of the same when the War Office was burned in November 1800, therefore there is no further data as to his services and no data as to his family on file.
