Bounty Land records relating to Owen Roberts BLWt2359-500 f59SC Transcribed and annotated by Will Graves 11/28/09: rev'd 5/3/24

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

Report of the Secretary of War to the House of Representatives, dated 15th of February 1791 See "American State Papers," No. 1, Volume of "Claims" page 25 in which Report the Secretary States that, Owen Roberts, was a Colonel of the South Carolina Continental Regiment of Artillery, and that he was mortally wounded in the service of his Country on the 20th of June 1779 [Battle of Stono Ferry, June 20, 1779]<sup>1</sup>-- 7 years half pay, viz. \$4,200, was granted the 16th of April 1792 to Representatives of Colonel Owen Roberts, deceased, -- see same Volume as above Page 387.

It appears from a Report of the Secretary of War, dated 15th of February 1791 (American State Papers, Volume of Claims). That the late Owen Roberts, was a Colonel of the South Carolina Regiment of Artillery, and that, he was mortally wounded in the service of his Country on the 20th of June 1779.

It appears at page 387, Volume aforesaid, that on the 16th April 1792, a Certificate for \$4,200 issued for the "Seven years half pay" due in right of the aforesaid Col. Roberts, deceased, including interest commencing June 20th 1786 –

Enclosed is the inquiries of a Gentleman who states that his Grand Father, Owen Roberts, who served by a vote of the Provincial Congress Major of the regular Forces, under Col. Christopher Gadsden of the 1<sup>st</sup> Regiment of Foot South Carolina June 2<sup>nd</sup>, 1775, and was afterwards promoted to the rank of Colonel of the 1<sup>st</sup> Regiment of Artillery, and was killed in the Attack on the British lines at Stono June 20<sup>th</sup>, 1779 – if he is Entitled to Land or Pension as the heir? –

Next inquiry is in relation to his Father Richard Brooth Roberts [sic. Richard Brook Roberts], who was an officer in the same Battle, and who received his Father's Sword at his death, with his request never to Sheath it until he saw his country free – he Served through the

Revolutionary War – was retained in the Peace establishment as a Major and died in the Service January 19<sup>th</sup>, 1797 – neither of the widows or children have ever received any Pension or Land, with the following exception ["] about 3 years since – My sister and myself received from the State of South Carolina 500 Acres of Land, that was for their Grand Father's Service."

I certify that satisfactory evidence was adduced to me to prove that Lucius Q. C. Roberts, Owen M. Roberts and Frances Maria Hurd<sup>3</sup> the wife of General N. M Hurd<sup>4</sup> of the City of Albany are the Grand Children and only heirs at law in fact to Owen Roberts who was a Colonel in the South Carolina Regiment of Continental Regiment of Artillery who it is said was killed in battle in the 20th June 1779.

Honorable C. Ellis [Chesselden Ellis] Member of Congress – Sir

Excuse me for taking the liberty of requesting a favor from you, you will probably remember by making out some paper for you to send to your Brother relative to some claims I might have for services rendered by my Grand Father in the Revolution. As you are now in Washington you would do me a great favor by investigating the business for me. I will give you some information so as to get you on the track -- My Grand Father Owen M. Roberts of South Carolina entered the regular forces by appointment from the Provincial Congress June 2nd 1775 and obtained the rank about June 5th 1775 as Major of the first Regiment of foot he was killed in the attack on the British lines at Stone [sic, Stono] South Carolina then a Colonel of Artillery under General Lincoln [Benjamin Lincoln] June 20th 1779.

My Father Richard Brook Roberts served as an officer through the whole of the War. I think my Father received a whole of his pay -- but there is still a claim for lands on the part of Grand Father, which never has been received. I wish you would look it all over for me and oblige your old friend. If you should wish for any further information please drop me a line. I

I, Lucius Q. C. Roberts an heir at law of Owen Roberts do, upon oath, testify and declare, to the best of my knowledge and belief, that Owen Roberts did enter the service in 1775, for the term of the war and served as a major in 1<sup>st</sup> Regiment of Infantry under command of Col. Gadson [sic, Christopher Gadsden] & afterwards as a Colonel in the Regiment No. 1<sup>st</sup> under the command of himself, of the Artillery line; and that he continued in the service aforesaid as Major & afterwards Colonel until the 20<sup>th</sup> June 1779.

I further declare that I have never received a warrant for the bounty land promised to said Roberts on the part of the United States; nor do I believe that he ever received it, or transferred his claim to it in any manner whatsoever: therefore,

Know all men by these presents, that I, Lucius Q. C. Roberts aforesaid, do hereby constitute and appoint Chesselden Ellis<sup>5</sup> of New York to be my true and lawful attorney, for me and in my name to demand and receive from the Secretary of War of the United States, a warrant for the quantity of land due to me as aforesaid; and my said attorney is hereby fully authorized and empowered to constitute and appoint one or more substitutes or attorneys under him, for the special purposes above expressed.
