## Pension application of Philip Thomas R10509 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later intereenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

His name appears on a list of applicants for invalid pension returned by the District Court for the District of Kentucky, North Carolina and South Carolina, submitted to the House of Representatives by the Secretary of War on April 25, 1794, and printed in the American State Papers, class 9, page 106.

Rank: Sergeant

3<sup>rd</sup> battalion of North Carolina

Disability: Wounded in the left arm, while in the actual line of his duty, at the action of the Eutaw Springs, <sup>1</sup> State of South Carolina.

When and where disabled: September 8, 1781, Eutaw Springs.

Residence: County of Duplin [North Carolina]

To what pension entitled: Full pension

Remarks: Enlisted in May 1781 for 12 months Evidence transmitted by the District Court perfect.

State of North Carolina, Cumberland County

On this 10<sup>th</sup> day of July 1843 personally appeared before the Subscriber an acting Justice of the peace in and for said County Barnabas Thomas a Resident of the County of Cumberland and State of North Carolina aged 68 who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the Benefit of the provision of the Act of Congress passed July 4<sup>th</sup>, 1836. That he is the son of Philip Thomas and that he has one brother named Tisdale Thomas and a Sister named Elizabeth Thomas who are also Residents of the State and County aforesaid are the children and heirs at law of Philip Thomas who was a Soldier of the Revolution. That their said father enlisted in the Army of the United States as a Sergeant in the 10<sup>th</sup> Regiment in Captain Doherly's<sup>2</sup> Company in the year 1781 and served until the 10<sup>th</sup> May 1782 as appears by the secretary of state's were certificate shown and he further Declares that the said Phillip Thomas Deceased on the 17<sup>th</sup> day of November 1819 died left a widow named Nancy who also died on the 12<sup>th</sup> day of December 1820 all of which will more fully appear by the evidence hereunto annexed. Sworn to and Subscribed on the day and year first above written.

State of North Carolina, Secretary of State's Office

I William Hill Secretary of State in and for the State of North Carolina, do hereby certify that it appears from the muster rolls of the Continental line of this State in the revolutionary War, that Philip Thomas a Sergeant in Captain Doherty's Company of the 10<sup>th</sup> Regiment<sup>3</sup> enlisted in 1781, his time was out 10<sup>th</sup> May 1872, nothing more said of him on the rolls.

Given under my hand this first day of November 1842.

[Notes: Nancy Thomas, widow of the veteran, died in 1820 and thus would not have qualified for any pension from the federal government in her own right. No federal pension act benefitted heirs of veterans or their widows.]
