



Declaration

In order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress of the 7th July 1898 entitleed an act of granting half pay and pention to certain Widows State of Tennessee Sullivan County SS on the 29th day of November 1845 personally appeared before the subscribeer a Justice of the peace. Mrs. Eleanor Vincent a resident of the County and State afforesaid aged eighty three yeares past who being first duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following statement declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provitions made by the act of Congress passed July the 7th 1838 granting half pay and pention to Certain Widows that She is the widow of George Vincent Who was an ensign and a Captain in the War of Revelution that he Served in the *malitia* [Militia] of Virginia that her husband the aforesaid. George Vincent Served as a Lieutenant in that line Several Campaigns one Campaign from Virginia to the Island in this now Sullivan County and he also spoke of a Campaign to Charleton [Charleston, SCI. She thinks the services as ensign were rendered in Seventy eight and 79 and he Spoke frequently of acting as a recruiting officer attending ocationly as Commisserry or agent buying provisions and Clothing for the army that he entered the Services as Captain in the year 1782 in North Carrelina [Carolina] and her understanding was that her husband George Vincent was actually engaged during the war of the Revolution Recruiting and in the garrison that he was Stationed for sum Considerable time in hallises fort north Carolina

that he served the Campaign from Virginia to island under captain Witcher and under *Col* sheley in the North Carolina service for further proof of Services she refers the department to the rolls and the proof herein after annext She further declares that She was Married to the said George Vincent on the 12th day of February 1784 that her husband aforesaid George Vincent died on the 7th day of December 1830. That She was not married to him prior to his leaving the Services but the marriage took place previous to the first of January Seventeen hundred and ninety four, *viz.* at the time above Stated and that the family record hereto annext is a true record of the marriage of George Vincent and Eleanor Vincent


I have known George Vincent a great many years say sixty-eight or seventy years he told me a great deal about his campaigning, he told of a campaign he called the blew and read stone [blue and red stone?] campaign I think it was the campaign that the battle was fought at the point or the mouth of the new river was fought, he was a Captain in that tour but after he was amongst the best of my knowledge.

[p 31] October the 2<sup>nd</sup> 1784 Sir

I request that you would immediately called your Company together in order to make a Collection of Money for the Support of Captain William Cock [William Cocke] Who is Chosen to Represent the Counties of Washington, Sullivan and Green [Greene] in Congress. You will give each man that gives money a receipt for what he gives so that he can settle with the Sheriff or Collector for said money in their next year's taxes. You will please to pay said money to Captain Cock by the 9<sup>th</sup> instant as he intends to start the 10<sup>th</sup> to Congress.



[Pedee River] and on the East side of the Yadkin River – they have taken Governor Burk [Thomas Burke] and all the principal Officers of Orange County the 12<sup>th</sup> instant & as I am informed have pushed for Wilmington. I have no Doubt of Every Exertion in your power & plead your speed & remain yours with Respect & Esteem

You will please to give your Company due notice on the same day a Court

martial will be held for the Trial of Captain Thomas Wallace, Please be particular in making out your Muster Roll that you can return the same to me on oath as the Law Requires.
