[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina Northampton County

On this the 28<sup>th</sup> day of October A.D. 1851 personally appeared before me the Chairman of the County Court of Northampton County State of North Carolina Rebecca Vinson a resident of said County and state aged seventy-two years who being duly sworn according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provisions made by the Act of Congress passed 29<sup>th</sup> July 1848 or any other act under which she may be entitled: That she is the widow of William Vinson who was a private in the Continental service in the Revolutionary War of 1776 between the United States and Great Britain, that he enlisted at the beginning of the war for 5 years and served his term with General Nath'l Green [Nathanael Greenel in North and South Carolina and after a recess was drafted in the North Carolina Militia and there remained until the close of the war, and that he was with General Washington at Yorktown Virginia. She further declares that she was married to the said William Vinson on or about the 10<sup>th</sup> day of October in the year 1798 and that her husband the aforesaid William Vinson died on or about the 10<sup>th</sup> day of February 1821 and that she was not married to him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the 2<sup>nd</sup> of January 1800 the is at the time above stated. She further swears that she is now a widow and that she never before made an application for a pension, and also that there is no record of said marriage with the said William Vinson, but which will however appear by reference to the proofs hereto annexed.

[p 10: On October 28, 1851 in Northampton County North Carolina, Benjamin Stevenson and Redman Vinson residents of Northampton County gave testimony that they are all well acquainted with Rebecca Vinson widow of William Vinson; that Rebecca married William Vinson in Northampton County on the 10<sup>th</sup> of October 1798; that they were married by John Barnes a Baptist preacher; that her name prior to her marriage was Rebecca Gatlin; that she is still the widow of William Vinson; that the affiants were close neighbors of William and Rebecca Vinson and have often heard him describe his services as stated by his widow in her application. The relationship, if any, of Redman Vinson to the veteran is not stated.]

[p 13: On December 23, 1852 in Northampton County North Carolina, Micajah Butler of said County gave testimony that he believes William and Rebecca Vinson were married about the year 1798 as he, the affiant was married in the same year and affiant has a son Micajah who is going on 53 years old; that the affiant has not The family record.]

[p 2: On February 9<sup>th</sup> 1852 in Northampton County North Carolina, Benjamin Stevenson and Charles Gatling gave testimony that they are aged respectively 69 and 72 years; all residents of Northampton County; have been well acquainted with William and Rebecca Vinson; that William has always had the reputation of being a revolutionary soldier; that William Vinson if living would be about 91 or 92 years old; that from the best of their recollection his hair and eyes were of a dark color, his height they think was about 5 fleet 10 inches and always understood that William Vinson came from Franklin County North Carolina; that William Vincent was a very illiterate man and No family record; that William and Rebecca had the following children: Jesse now living aged 53, Robert living aged 49, Alesy living aged 46, Lucy living aged 42, William living aged 34, Elizabeth living aged 29, and Charles did without children. The relationship, if any, of the affiants to the veteran and/or his widow is not stated.]
