Pension application of Richard Whitehurst R11456 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina Pitt County SS

On this 10th day of August [year not stated] personally appeared in open court before the Justices of the Court of Pleas and Quarter Sessions for the State and County aforesaid now sitting, Richard Whitehurst a resident of Pitt County and State of North Carolina aged Seventy Seven years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832. --

That he entered the Service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

That he was a resident of this County drafted in Captain John Salter's Company under the command of General Nash [Francis Nash], the Colonel was Colonel Armstrong -- and marched immediately to Wilmington through Craven County and so on. That he was on a three months Tour and was [at] Wilmington when the Declaration of Independence [July 4, 1776] was proclaimed; from which place he was discharged and returned home. At the time General Craig [sic, Major James H. Craig, the commander of the British forces occupying Wilmington, NC]¹ was passing through this Country he volunteered his services under the command of General Caswell [Richard Caswell] & Colonel Gorham [James Gorham], he does not recollect what Captain's company he was then at this time. They pursued Craig's Army over the Trent River and towards Wilmington but did not overtake the Main Army, were engaged in a little skirmish with some of the outskirts. That time he was absent only about four weeks and was discharged, for which service he did not receive any pay.

In 1781, he again volunteered and went to Kinston, but was in no engagement -- and was not absent longer than two or three [weeks, months or years? most likely weeks] which was at the time Corn Wallace [sic, Cornwallis] was passing through the Country.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency in any State.
