

Southern Campaign American Revolution Pension Statements

Pension application of Abram Elledge R13966

South Carolina, Greenville District

On this 29th day of January 1848 personally appeared in open Court before the Court of ordinary now sitting Abram Elledge a resident of Greenville district South Carolina aged Eighty six years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th, 1832. That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated: he volunteered under Captain Hartgraves under Colonel Benjamin Cleveland in Wilkes County North Carolina on the first of August 1780 and served six months during his service he marched down through North Carolina into South Carolina as guard to Colonel Cleveland's baggage train then returned again to Wilkes North Carolina at which place he was discharged at the end of six months that he had served and that his said discharge was burned by fire and that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of but one person who can testify to his services that is Ephraim Elledge whose testimony he has procured. He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.
