Pension application of Peyton Rudder R17581 Transcribed by Will Graves f7VA 8/13/12

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

Milton N.C. June 13th 1853

Dear Sir.

I have been applied to by Mrs. Elmira Robertson in relation to claim of her two children Mary Ann Robertson and John E. Robertson to the pension money due from the estate of their great uncle Peyton Rudder late of Charlotte County Virginia an officer of the Virginia line in the Revolutionary War. Mr. Rudder left no children and Edward Robertson the father of the two children here named and a Mrs. Eleanor Crowder who lives in Kentucky were the children of a deceased sister and five persons by the name of Finch. Adam Finch and others are claiming what is due to their uncle on account of his services he being one of the officers of the Virginia line who were entitled to half pay. Mrs. Robertson states that a man by the name of Bedford in Charlotte County is prosecuting the claim and she thinks their purpose is to [indecipherable word]¹ her children out of their [indecipherable word]² their father and Mrs. Eleanor Crowder widow of Robert A. Crowder deceased were the children of Polly Rudder, who married Christopher Robertson deceased.

You will please look into the matter and have the children of Mrs. Robertson made party claimants for the pension and she will pay you for your trouble & expect to go up to Rockingham County tomorrow to attest to the application of a widow of a soldier of the Revolution whose husband drew a pension under a former act of Congress and who was [indecipherable word or words]³ since 1800. Right knee as soon as you look into the matter referred to in this letter.
