Dear Sir

Your favour of the  $9^{th}$  inst was duly received, and in answer thereto have only to say that as a member of the Legislature of the State of Pennsylvania Session 36 & 37 I applied for and received for her the usual grant of the State by an unanemous vote of the House.

In yours received by me you state that John Meyers is marked upon the list as a deserter in 1778, from Pulaski's Legion. The affidavit of Susan Crock being the earliest information at hand I have hereby inclosed the event that followed the Battle near Charleston under Genl Pulaski and Col. Cowith, who were killed [see note below], caused the dismemberment of the Army – but John Meyers reenlisted under Col or Gen'l. Deluson [probably Col. Armand-Louis de Gontau, duc de Lauzun], in the Company commanded by Captain Miskefsky, and that he remained in the army under said Commander and others until after the defeat of and Surrender of Lord Cornwallis at York Town [19 Oct 1781], other evidence if indespensibly necessary might though with expense be obtained.

N.B. Jno. Genther of Easton Pa. is said to be living, well known to the family and says he served with John Meyers during the war.

NOTE: Gen. Kazimierz Pulaski was mortally wounded at the Siege of Savannah, 9 Oct 1779, and Col. Michael de Kowatch was killed at the skirmish at the Old Race Track near Charleston, 11 May 1779.
