Pension application of Jesse Rose R9002 Transcribed by Will Graves f21VA 7/27/12

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

[There is no application in this file. There is a note indicating that the application was sent to George Green August 16 1842. There is also correspondence in the file indicating that the veteran applied for service having been drafted for six months while living in Berkeley County Virginia in August or September 1781. He participated in the capture of Cornwallis [October 19, 1781] and assisted in guarding the prisoners to Fort Frederick. That he was discharged in November 1781 prior to his term of service expiring. Because he served less than the required 6 months, he was not eligible for a pension under the 1832 act. He was living in Ellsworth Ohio in May 1846. On November 16, 1852 in Mahoning County Ohio, David Rose, a resident of Ellsworth in the County of Mahoning Ohio executed a power of attorney authorizing his attorney to pursue the pension due his father for services in the revolution.

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
