Jonathan Smith. Applicant.

On the 6th Nov. 1834 this Applicant stated that during the war of the Revolution he lived in Taggarts Vally [sic: Tygart Valley]. that he was out a Spying two or three days, and he was out one scout for the week. – he once helped bury some dead that were killed by the Indians, and was sent on to Staunton as an express. – and this comprises all the services he done. he gave the same statement now given to William McCord of Pocahontas who sent his declaration – and who said he would get the money for him in two months. – his Declaration was made in March 1834. he swore to it before Gen'l. Booth a Justice of Randolph Cty. A Copy W. G Singleton Nov. 27 1834
