Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." State of Kentucky Scott County: SS

On this 22nd day of September 1832 John Lackland personally appeared before me, a Justice of the peace of said State & County, said Lackland being a resident of Scott County & State of Kentucky, aged seventy-seven years, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832. That he was born in the year 1756 on the 9th day of August & the record of his age is in his Bible now in his house. That he was living in Rockbridge County, Virginia, when he was called into the service by a draft for three months. That he served under Captain Jno. Vanmeter of the Militia; he cannot state the day or year he entered the service – it was in the spring of the year; he was first marched to Pittsburgh & then to Wheeling & there remained the three months, when he was marched back to Pittsburgh & there discharged. That while he was at Wheeling the Indians, that summer, attacked the Fort, burnt some of the buildings, killed 50 or 60 persons as well as he recollects & all the cattle they could come at. That several years after that about three months before the defeat or surrender of Cornwallis [October 19, 1781], he was again drafted for three months he still living in Rockbridge County, & served under Captain David Gray of the Militia & was marched to the siege of York where he served until the expiration of his term, a few days before the surrender of Cornwallis, when he was discharged & returned home – That he never had a written discharge. That his last named Captain died in Kentucky near 15 or 16 years ago, on Hickman Creek. He does not know where his first Captain is, nor whether he is alive. At the siege of York, it would seem to be useless to state that General Washington was there, Lafayette &, &. That he has no documentary evidence by which to establish these facts & no person alive, that he knows of, whose testimony he can procure who can testify to his service. That he is known to the following persons in his neighborhood, who can testify as to his character for veracity & their belief of his services as a soldier of the revolution as stated – viz.: James Patterson Esquire a justice of the peace – Asa Payne Esquire, J. T. Johnson, Joel Johnson, R. M. Johnson &c – Sworn to & subscribed the day & year above.

the foregoing declaration was subscribed and sworn to by John Lackland on the date therein

named, before me a Justice of the peace for the said County and State and that the applicant is unable to attend court by reason of bodily infirmity. Given under my hand this 22nd day of September 1832.

[Veteran was pensioned at the rate of \$20 per annum commencing March 4th, 1831, for service as a private for 6 months in the Virginia militia.]
