Pension application of Simpson Warren S18262 Transcribed by Will Graves f13VA 8/7/11: rev'd 6/2/17

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

On this 25th day of October A.D. 1832 personally appeared in open Court it being a court of record having a seal & a clerk, before Richard Gantt one of the Judges of the Court of Sessions & Common Pleas of the said State now sitting Simpson Warren a resident of the District & State aforesaid of the age of about seventy years (though he has no record of his age) who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7, 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers & served as herein stated: He resided in Halifax County in Virginia where he enlisted, he enlisted under Captain Rodgers, Lieutenant Street & Ensign Shackelford in the Virginia line & was marched through Petersburg, Williamsburg & Yorktown to Groyn Island where the British were then stationed at: the field officers were Colonel Christie [William Christian?], Lewis & Margan; he enlisted for three months, but served out six months, he was in no engagement during the time: He served three months of the above time against the Indians at the Long Islands of Holston; he has no discharge he never took a discharge. He has no living witness to prove his service within his reach: he hereby relinquishes all claim to a pension except the present & he says he is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

On this first day of November A.D. 1833 personally appeared in open Court (it being a court of record having a seal and a clerk, before John S Richardson one of the Judges of the Court of Sessions & common pleas for the said State now sitting Simpson Warren a resident of the district and state aforesaid aged about 71 years of age who being duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath, make the following additional declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed 7 of June 1832.

This declarant can't say but little in addition to his former declaration, he can only say that he believes it was in the year 1775 that this service was performed; he wishes here to be understood as repeating all he has said in his former declaration and he here says that all that he

said there he now believes to be true.

Interrogatories

Interrogatory 1st Where and in what year were you born?

Answer – I was born in Halifax County State of Virginia: I don't know the time.

2nd Have you any record of your age and if so where is it?

Answer. I have no record of my age.

3rd Where were you living when called into service: where have you lived since the Revolutionary War and where do you now live?

Answer. I was living in Halifax County State of Virginia, soon after the Revolution I removed to Abbeville District State of South Carolina where I do now live.

4th How were you called into service; were you drafted; did you volunteer or were you a substitute, and if in substitute, for whom?

Answer – I entered the service as an enlisted soldier.

5th State the names of some of the regular officers who were with the troops when you served, such Continental and militia regiments as you can recollect and the general circumstances of your service.

Answer to 5th. Colonels Christie, Lewis & Morgan, upon our going to Groyer Island, the Indians all fled, about this time Colonel Christie went out to form a treaty with the Indians

6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the service, and if so, by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Answer. I never took a discharge

7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity and their belief in your services as a soldier in the revolution.
