## Pension application of John Robeson (Robinson) S32488 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

## State of Illinois

Madison County SS

On this fourth day of September in the year 1832 personally appeared in open Court before their Honors the Judges of the County Commissioners Court for Madison County, now sitting, John Robinson [sic] a resident of Madison County and State of Illinois, aged 69 years who being first duly sworn according to law, doth, on his oath, make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7, 1832.

That he the said John Robinson entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

That he volunteered in the town of Hillsborough in the County of Orange, and State of North Carolina in the month of March 1780, and belonged to the company commanded by Captain Rose [Howell Rose] (the other company officers not recollected) and in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Hugh Tonnell [Hugh Tinnen], Major Hopkins and marched from Hillsborough for Charleston and arrived at Lunpine's Point [Lampriere's Point] and remained there a few days under the command of Colonel Molmerday [Marquis Francis de Malmedy] and then crossed over to Charleston, and was there under the command of General Lincoln [Benjamin Lincoln] till the town surrendered to the British [May 12, 1780] and was among the prisoners, and when they were paroled he returned to Hillsborough, here he again volunteered at or about the time of the battle of Guilford [March 15, 1781], and belonged to the Company commanded by Captain Redguins [?], Colonel William O'Neale's [William O'Neal's] Regiment and was sometimes in the companies commanded by Captains Nathaniel Christmas and William Duglass [William Douglas] of the same Regiment.

He also declares that he was under the command of Colonel Thompson<sup>3</sup> when Hillsborough was taken [September 12, 1781]<sup>4</sup> and in the battle. That he was in the Army at the time of the battle of Lindley's Mills [September 13, 1781]<sup>5</sup> but he was not in the engagement being detached to take care of the prisoners at the time. Colonel Robert Mabin [sic, Robert Mebane] commanded in the engagement but the chief command was in General Butler [John

Butler]. He was under Colonel O'Neale at the time Colonel Fanning [David Fanning] a Tory was attacked and defeated at Solomon Cox's with the loss of 2 or 300 of his Tories. He declares that they ranged through Orange, Guilford and Wake Counties in pursuit of the Tories and had frequent engagements with them till they were all dispersed and the war closed in North & South Carolina, and as neigh as he can recollect till October 1782, when he was discharged by Colonel O'Neale, making more than 2 years in the actual service of the United States during the war of the Revolution, that is to say from March 1780 to October 1782. He further declares that he was in the Indian service during the Campaigns of Generals Clark and Scott in 1786, and 1792.


He further declares that he was born on the 19th day of January 1763, in the State of Maryland, but his parents moved to Orange County when he was but a child and lived there till the year 1783 when he left Hillsborough went to the State of Kentucky where he lived till 1810 when he came to Madison County Illinois where he has resided most of the time since. There are no records of his birth that he knows of. He has no documents by which to prove his services, as he never received but one discharge and was lost long since.

And he knows of but two persons by whom he can prove his services, one of those William McAdams lives in Madison County and served with him most of the time during his service and the other Joseph McAdams who lives in Bond County in this State who knew him and was occasionally with him in the service.

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

William McAdams<sup>6</sup> a resident of Madison County and State of Illinois, hereby certifies that [he] knows John Robinson, who has sworn to and subscribed the above declaration, and is well acquainted with him, that he knows that he performed most of the services as therein stated as he was with him most of the time except at Charleston and believes that he served as therein stated, and also believes that he served more than two years during the war of the Revolution and that the said Robinson is a man of Truth and veracity.



State of Illinois Madison County

Personally appeared before me the undersigned a Justice of the peace within and for the County of Madison and State of Illinois John Robinson, who being duly sworn deposeth and saith that by reason of old age and the consequent loss of memory he cannot swear positively as to the precise length of his service but according to the best of his recollection he served not less than the period mentioned below and in the following grade. For two years and five months I served as a private, and for such service I claim a pension.
