Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

District of Illinois SS White Circuit

On this twenty ninth day of June 1821 personally appeared in open Court (this being a Court of record expressly made so by the Statutes of this State) for the County of White in the State of Illinois, Thomas Thompson a resident of the County of White in said State aged sixty years & about 10 months old who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the provision made by the Acts of Congress of the 18th of March 1818 and the 1st of May 1820 that he the said Thomas Thompson enlisted for the term of eighteen months sometime in the month of July (the date not recollected) 1779 in the State of Virginia & County of Botetourt in the Company commanded by Captain Thomas Boyer [Thomas Bowyer] in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Abraham Buford in the line of the State of Virginia on the Continental Establishment that the company to which he belonged joined the Army under the Command of General Green in the month of September or October 1779, that he continued to serve in the said Corps and until the month of January 1781 when he was discharged from the service at Charlotte in the state of South Carolina [sic, North Carolina] that he served under Colonel Blueford [Buford] until sometime in the winter 1779 & 1780 when he volunteered to serve in the Calvary [cavalry] & was transferred to said Troops commanded by Colonel Washington [William Washington] and continued to serve under Colonel Washington for at least eight months when he returned to the Regiment in which he enlisted which was at that time under the command of Colonel Edmison¹ & continued in said Regiment until his discharge as aforesaid -

That he was in the Battle of Guilford [March 15, 1781], the Siege of Ninety Six [May 21-June 19, 1781] and the Battle of Eutaw Springs [September 8, 1781] and was wounded at the said Siege of Ninety Six in the leg, and that he has no other evidence now in his power of his said Services except his own oath.

And in pursuance of the act of the first of May 1820, I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed

Applicant has a wife named Nancy aged about fifty-six years – she is so great a cripple as to be unable to walk & can do no kind of laborious work -- he has no children living with him – He is a cripple himself in consequence of the wound he received during the revolutionary war & is unable to support himself & wife by his labor. He is a laborer by occupation.
