Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of Pennsylvania SS

On the third day of April A.D. 1818 before me Richard Peters Judge of the district Court of the United States in and for the Pennsylvania district personally appeared Patrick Welsh who being duly sworn on the Holy Evangelists of Almighty God deposes and declares that during the War of the Revolution he served as a soldier in the Continental Army against the common enemy, that on the 17th day of December 1776, he enlisted as a private in Captain Peter Brinn Bruen's [sic, Peter Bryan Bruin's] company belonging to the 11th Virginia Regiment of Infantry of the United States commanded by Colonel Morgan [Daniel Morgan], that he remained with said company for two years and upwards, that Colonel Morgan was appointed to a Regiment of Riflemen when Lieutenant Colonel Fiebuger [sic, Christian Febiger] took command of the Regiment that on Lieutenant Colonel Fiebuger's promotion to the command of the 2nd Virginia Regiment in the service of the United States deponent was transferred in the said Regiment and served in Captain company – deponent continued in the service of the United States in said Regiment until discharged on the 10th of February 1782 during which period deponent was present and took part in the battles of Brandywine, Monmouth and Stoney Point – that in consequence of infirmities and diseases incurred during the course of his service as well as from old age he is now reduced to circumstances of great indigence and distress and in need of assistance from his Country for support.

And this Deponent further declares that he is at present and has been for upwards of 20 years a resident citizen of the state of Pennsylvania and that he does not at present receive and never has received or been allowed any Pension by the laws of the United States.

On the eighth day of September 1820 personally appeared in the said District Court of the United States, the said Court being a Court of Record, having a Clerk, aged Seal and keeping a Record of its proceedings, Patrick Welch, aged seventy-three years, residing in Philadelphia who being first duly sworn in open Court, according to Law, on his Oath declares, that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows, viz.

In the 11th & 2nd Virginia Regiment's under the command of Colonel Febiger – In

Company Commanded by Captain Gamble – Date of Original Declaration 3rd April 1818. Number of Pension Certificate 3921.

And I the said Patrick Welsh do further solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress entitled "an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war" passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed Sworn to and declared in open Court on the 8th day of September 1820

I have no Property of any Description whatever: and by Occupation a Coach Painter, but have not been able to work for the last 7 years. I have no children and being severely afflicted with Rheumatism and bad eyesight am unable to support myself without the Assistance of my Country.

This is to certify that Patrick Welch formerly of my Regiment Enlisted into the Virginia Line on the 17 day of December 76 – his first Enlistment expired on the 17 day of December 1779 he was promoted to a Sergeant and reenlisted for 18 months for John Tues Devition in Spotsylvania that Term being Expired he is at his own request discharged from any further service in the Army of the United States and permitted to pass and repassed free and unmolested to within the bounds of those states or their friends and allies he having received his Bounty pay and Clothing and Deficiency of pay and Clothing except such as is specified on the back hereof he has served under my immediate command since his first Enlistment and upwards of 3 years attached to my person During which time he behaved himself as a brave and Orderly Soldier faithfull honest and industrious Man and as such I recommend to the attention of every Good Man. Given at Cumberland Old Court house this 10 day of February 1782
