[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

State of North Carolina Halifax County

This day William Brewer came before me J J Daniel one of the Judges of the Superior Courts of law & Equity for the State aforesaid & made oath that he was a soldier in the North Carolina Continental line of Infantry during the revolutionary War. He entered he thinks in the spring of the year 1781 for eighteen months & served upwards of twelve months when peace took place & he was discharged. – He has lost his discharge. – He enlisted under Captain Peter Pecoats [sic, Peter Bacot, of the Regiment commanded by Colonel Lytle [Archibald Lytle]. He does not recollect the No. He says he had served twelve months before in the Continental service under Captain Hall & was at the Battle of Guilford. He is now 64 years of age & is very poor and stands in need of the assistance of his country for support. He prays the benefit of the act of Congress for the relief of old Soldiers & [indecipherable word or words and or symbols]

I William Hill Secretary of State in & for the State aforesaid do hereby Certify that it appears from the musterrolls of the Continental line of this State that William Brewer a private in Captain Bacots Company of the 10th Regiment was mustered in 1782 for 18 months but nothing said of his discharge. District of North Carolina Halifax County: Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions August Term 1820

On this 24th day of August 1820 personally appeared in open Court (being a Court of record for the said district) William Brewer age sixty-five years resident of Halifax in said district who being 1st duly sworn according to law doth on his oath declare that he served in the Revolutionary War as follows, that he was attached as a private to the North Carolina line commanded by General Greene of Captain Peter Pecote's that he has received no pension but that by a Certificate of the War Department dated 28th of June 1820 he is enlisted as a pension of \$8 per month commencing 21st day of December 1819. And I do solemnly swear that I was a resident Citizen of the United States on the 18th day of March 1818 and that I have not since that time by gift, sale or in any manner whatever disposed of my property or any part thereof with intent thereby so to diminish it as to bring myself within the provision of an act of Congress

entitled “an act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval service of the United States in the revolutionary war” passed on the 18th day of March 1818, and that I have not nor has any person in trust for me any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me nor have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule hereto annexed and by me subscribed, one horse worth \$30 & one bed six Pigs worth 9² [?] each that he is by occupation a farmer but his ill health renders him almost unable to attend to it that he is in such indigent Circumstances as to be unable to support himself that he has no family.
