Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

State of North Carolina, Edgecombe County: August Term 1832 Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions

On this 27th day of August personally appeared before the Justices of the Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions Richard Taylor, aged 85 years: a native of Virginia but now resident of Edgecombe County North Carolina, who being first duly sworn doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers & served as herein stated.

He volunteered in the Army of the United States and was attached to the Company of Captain James Ballard – Lieutenant Silas Ballard. The Company belonged to the Regiment of Colonel Whitmel Hill [sic, Whitmell Hill]. He marched from Halifax where the Regiment had been formed to the County of Guilford North Carolina and was at the battle of Guilford [March 15, 1781]: from Guilford he returned to Edgecombe. He remained by direction of Col. Hill ready to turn out until August and was ordered to a rendezvous at Tarboro' and discharged by Colonel Clinch [James Clinch] on account of bodily infirmity.

This service embraced a period of seven months – These facts he proves by the oath of John Moore¹ & Jesse Coburn.²

He hereby relinquishes every claim to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of any agency of any State.
