Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]


State of Virginia Rockingham County: SS

On this 17th day of September 1832 – personally appeared in open Court before Jacob Hansbarger, Robert Gratton, Jr., Johnathan Peal & Charles C. Spears Gentlemen Justices the Court of Rockingham County now sitting, John Taylor a resident of the County of Rockingham in the State of Virginia aged seventy-five years who being first duly sworn according to law – Doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed the 7th day of June 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served as herein stated.

That he first entered the service of the United States from his residence in said County sometime in the year 1778 as a volunteer under Captain Robert Cravens [Robert Craven] – Michael Trout Lieutenant, George Mallow Ensign served in Tygers Valley [Tygart's Valley]—served three months was discharged but received no written discharge. That he entered the service of the United States the second time as a volunteer sometime about the first day of September 1778 under Captain Robert Cravens, Colonel Benjamin Harrison, under the command of Colonel Crawford & General McIntosh, served at Fort McIntosh – Muskingum & on the Ohio River, served four months this tour was regularly discharged but received no written discharge. That he has no distinct recollection other than before stated of the dates or names of Officers. That he has no documentary evidence of his services – that he can prove his services as aforesaid by John Nicholas¹ & George Argutright² – who is now in court for that purpose.³ He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the agency of any State.

Sworn to & subscribed on the day & year aforesaid.
