Pension application of John Wait S7812 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." The State of South Carolina Laurens District: In the Common Pleas

On the 17th day of October 1832 personally appeared before the Honorable Richard Gantt one of the Judges of the Court of Common Pleas in open Court, now sitting, John Wait a resident of Laurens district in the State of South Carolina aged seventy-five years, who being duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of Congress passed June the 7th 1832. That he enlisted in the Army of the United States in the year 1776 with Captain John Thornton and served in the 3rd Continental Regiment of the Virginia line under the following named Officers, the is: Colonel Mercer, Lieutenant Colonel Wheaton, Major Marshall, Captain John Thornton, 1st Lieutenant Robert Powell, 2nd Lieutenant John Kemp who afterwards exchanged commands with Lieutenant James Manroe [James Monroe] who became my 2nd Lieutenant. He was discharged and left the service of the 8th day of February 1778. That he resided at the time he entered the service in Culpeper County in the State of Virginia. He enlisted for two years and was discharged by General Woodford at the Valley Forge in Pennsylvania that he was in the Battle near the White Plains in New York and that the taking of the Hessians at Trenton in New Jersey. He marched from Virginia through Maryland, Pennsylvania, New Jersey and New York and then back into Pennsylvania -

I hereby relinquish every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declare that my name is not on the pension Roll of any agency of any State.

Sworn to and subscribed the day and year aforesaid.

South Carolina Laurens District: Personally appeared before me the undersigned a justice of the peace for the district and State aforesaid Richard Gaines¹ who being duly sworn deposeth and saith that he was acquainted with and served with John Wait in the Continental Army of the United States during the Revolutionary War and that he served as an enlisted Soldier 2 years in the Virginia line in the Regiment commanded by Colonel Mercer known as the 3rd Continental Regiment of the Virginia line –

[fn p. 10: On February 5, 1834 in Laurens district South Carolina Elizabeth Creecy gave testimony that she had known John Wait upwards of 62 years that he enlisted in the 3rd Regiment of Virginia regulars under "Captain John Thorington" in the month of February 1776 and returned in the month of March 1778 and that he had enlisted for 2 years. Fn p. 11: Thomas Gaines² gave an identical affidavit dated February 7th, 1834.
