## Pension application of Waring Williams S7946

Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." ## State of North Carolina, Hertford County } SS

On this 29<sup>th</sup> day of August 1832 personally appeared Waring Williams in open Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions now sitting, a resident of County & State aforesaid aged Sixty-Nine years, and being duly sworn according to Law doth make his oath to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress passed June 7<sup>th</sup> 1832 – that he entered the service of the United States as a private as substitute for Mat Buxton in Northampton County North Carolina in the year 1781 for the space of three months under Captain Henry Dawson North Carolina Militia, General Jones commanded, with his company he marched to Salisbury North Carolina where he was taken sick, & was left in the Hospital there – this was the year that General Greene [Nathanael Greene] came to the South.<sup>1</sup> He was sick 25 or 30 days, he recovered and overtook his company at the 6 mile Run in North Carolina. There they remained until his discharge took place. The Discharge was signed by Captain Dawson but is lost. The applicant returned home to Hertford County North Carolina and was a substitute for Hardy Britt a the private in Captain Job Yeates's [Job Yates'] Company, Col. Dozier's [Peter Dauge] Regiment North Carolina Militia – he marched to North West River Bridge where the troops were commanded by General William Gregory, here he served his term of service out, his discharge was signed by General Gregory, but is lost.

The applicant then returned home & was drafted as a private to serve in Captain T. Gregory's [Thomas Gregory's] company North Carolina militia for three months – marched with said company to North West River Bridge where he served his time out – and he received his discharge & returned home. He has no documentary Evidence to support his claim, but believes the testimony of James Godwin<sup>2</sup> & James Weston to be material for him which is herewith submits, Mark A.

He hereby relinquishes every claim to a pension except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension roll of the Agency of any State.

The Court then propounded the questions as prescribed in the Circular of the War Department the applicant being in open Court and on oath – in answer to the questions

4<sup>th</sup> I was a substitute in the first tour for Mat Buxton a private in Captain H. Dawson's Company in Northampton, & 2<sup>nd</sup> tour I was a substitute for Hardy Britt a private in Captain Job Yeates Company Col. Dozier's Regiment & lastly I was drafted under Captain T. Gregory's company North Carolina militia.

5<sup>th</sup> General Jones of North Carolina, General Nathanael Greene, General Gregory 6<sup>th</sup> I received discharges from my commanding officers but those discharges I have mislaid or lost.

This 29<sup>th</sup> of August 1832 appeared in open Court of Pleas & Quarter Sessions James Weston<sup>3</sup> and having been duly sworn says that he is well acquainted with the applicant Waring Williams was a private in Captain Job Yeates Company Captain Dozier's Regiment North Carolina militia that he served three months at North West River Bridge North Carolina in the year 17\_\_\_ Troops commanded by General William Gregory.

James Godwin also swears that he knew Waring Williams very well and that in the year of 17\_\_\_ said Williams was a private in Captain Thomas Gregory ['s company], Colonel Dozier's Regiment militia that he marched to North West River Bridge where he served a tour of three months – Troops commanded by General William Gregory.
