To the Honorable the President and Members of the Senate – The Petition of Rhoda Craig Respectfully Sheweth

That your Petitioner is the widow of James Craig who was killed when on Duty as a Soldier in the service of this State on the 1<sup>st</sup> day of February 1781.<sup>2</sup> Your petitioner apprehends that she is entitled to a pension from the time of the Death of her said Husband. Your Petitioner also states that the Treasure[r] has paid her annuity only from the 11<sup>th</sup> January 1785 – and Does not Considered himself at liberty to pay her for any time antecedent to the period last Mentioned – Your Petitioner therefore prays your Honorable House to authorize & Require the Treasure[r] at Columbia to pay to her the arrears which are as She Conceives Still due from the 1<sup>st</sup> of January 1781 to the 11<sup>th</sup> January 1785 – and your Petitioner as in Duty Bound will ever pray S/ Rhoda Craig
