Pension application of Charles Sexton SC17 Transcribed by Will Graves

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

June 2, 1818

The following persons who reside in the county of Russell wishing to become pensioners under the act of Congress of the 18th of March last, entitled "An Act to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval services of the United States", declared on oath as follows:

Charles Sexton declared that he enlisted as a private soldier in a company commanded by Capt. Thomas, attached as he believed to the 25th Regiment¹ of the South Carolina Line under the command of Colo. Thomas Brannon [Thomas Brandon²]; He was at the battle of the Cow Pens [Cowpens, January 17, 1781] and served in the Cherokee Nation under General Williamson [Andrew Williamson]. He also declared that he was discharged in South Carolina by Capt. Thomas having served eighteen months, and that he is now in indigent circumstances.

It also appears to the satisfaction of the court that the aforesaid applicants are persons of good credit as witnesses, and that they served in the Revolutionary War against the common enemy; and it was also satisfactorily proven to the court that the said John Ferrall, Leonard Pigman, Carlton Keeling, John Sykes, Abraham Childers, James Berry, Charles Sexton and Jacob Hess according to the report of their neighbors previous to the passage of the said Act of Congress had served as soldiers in the Revolutionary War; All which is ordered to be certified to the Secretary of the Department of War.

¹ No such Regiment existed in the South Carolina Continental line

 $^{^{2}}$ Thomas Brandon was a militia officer in the South Carolina militia. He never held an office or commission in the Continental line.
