I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]

The Petition of Charles Miller of Chester District Sheweth that your petitioner was a Soldier in the American Service during the Revolutionary War, that he was out in the Army different Tours and Served his Country faithfully during her struggle for independence that whilst engaged with the British in the Contest for liberty he received Several wounds from the Enemy that in an engagement near Coosahateky Bridge [sic, Coosawhatchie, May 3, 1779]<sup>2</sup> your Memorialist was Knocked down by the limb of a Tree supposed to be cut off by a Cannon Ball of the enemy and was carried off the ground much damaged & had to return home until he was able again to take the field and that your petitioner was once more grievously wounded at an engagement known by the name of Sumpter's defeat [the Battle of Fishing Creek, August 18, 1780]<sup>3</sup> near Fishing Creek in Chester District that he was Attacked by the British Cavalry and Chopped in the head and shoulder & trod down & left for dead, that his Scull [Skull] was Cut and fractured in Such a manner that the membrane that covered his Brain might easily be seen that your petitioner does yet very Sensibly feel the Effects of the Wounds and until now never made application for the pecuniary Assistance of his Country for the wounds he received but as he is now become old and infirm & very unfit for labour he hopes your Honorable Body will

Johnson noted that even at that time the word "meet" was rarely so used. It must have become fairly popular in South Carolina in the early 1800's, however, as it appears in many petitions submitted to the SC Legislature.
