[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8<sup>th</sup> of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]



To the Senate and House of Representatives of the State of South Carolina

The humble petition of Samuel Stalnaker of the State aforesaid and District of Abbeville Sheweth,

That your petitioner is a soldier of the Revolution, That early in the war he attached himself to a company of militia commanded by Captain Briant [Robert Bryant], that he served at the Siege of Ninety Six [May 21-June 19, 1781],<sup>2</sup> under Colonel Hammond [Samuel Hammond], that he served more than a year under the Command of Captain Briant, that afterwards Bryant was appointed to a command in the regular service and Captain William Cane took his place, that he marched to Augusta under the Command of Cain [sic] and served at the Siege of that place<sup>3</sup> that he performed several tours of duty throughout this State under the Command of Lieutenant Howard, and under General Pickens [Andrew Pickens], That he was in several

expeditions against the Cherokee Indians with, Majors Bowie [John Bowie] and Tutt [Benjamin Tutt], under the command of General Pickens. That he thinks he was in the service of the State for nearly three years, That he is now old and infirm, being eighty two years of age and is incapable of supporting himself by labor, that he is in indigent circumstances, as the annexed Schedule of his property will show, He therefore prays your Honorable body to place him on the pension list will grant him such other relief as in your wisdom you may think meet<sup>4</sup> and as in duty bound he will ever pray

Johnson noted that even at that time the word "meet" was rarely so used. It must have become fairly popular in South Carolina in the early 1800's, however, as it appears in many petitions submitted to the SC Legislature.

To the Honorable the Senate & House of Representatives and General Assembly The humble Petition of Elizabeth Stalnaker

Sheweth,

That about twenty-six years ago she became the wife of Samuel Stalnaker late of Abbeville District, And That She Is Now Upwards of Seventy Years of Age her late husband said Samuel Stalnaker was a soldier of the Revolution, & a pensioner of this State, and that he died 7 March last, leaving your petitioner in a very destitute situation.

She therefore prays that she may as the widow of the said pensioner be placed on the Pension Roll of the State and be allowed to receive such pension as is usually granted to widows of deceased pensioners.

And she will pray &c
