I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

To the Honorable the President and members of the Senate of the State of South Carolina at Colombia Assembled, the Petition of John Gordon of Wmsburg [Williamsburg] County, respectfully Sheweth,

That your Petitioner, the only acting Administrator to the estate of Roger Gordon³ deceased having neglected the payment of the public Taxes for said Estate since the passing of the act in the year 1783 exempting the Estates of Widows and orphans of officers and men killed in the actual service of their Country, to a certain amount, from paying the Tax imposed by law on others – That this neglect in your petitioner, having originated not from [undeciphered word]⁴ in complying with the laws of his Country as a good citizen, but solely from a full persuasion that this privilege was still in force, & being now threatened with an execution on the property of the said Estate by the public tax Collector, to the great injury & distress of an only surviving Orphan. Your petitioner therefore with all due deference requests that your Honorable body would exonerate him from the operation of any existing law to the contrary or grant to said Orphan such other relief as to you in your wisdom & deliberation shall seem meet⁵ – & your petitioner will ever pray &c

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⁵ In Samuel Johnson's Dictionary of 1755, the first definition of the word "meet" he gives is "Fit; proper...." Johnson noted that even at that time the word "meet" was rarely so used. It must have become fairly popular in South Carolina in the early 1800's, however, as it appears in many petitions submitted to the SC Legislature.
