

I Richard Winn of Winnsborough Esquire do hereby assign the full Amount of Principal and Interest now due and to grow due on the within Certificate & which I have purchased of the within named Henry Hunter as appears by his Order<sup>2</sup> now lying in the Office of the Commissioners of the Treasury unto Messrs Lawson Price & Co. of Charleston Merchants their Executors, Administrators & Assigns full Value Received from the said Lawson Price & Co. this 25<sup>th</sup> day of July 1785
