[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

[Note: The following affidavit appears in support of a claim made in 1824 by James Little for reimbursement of supplies provided to the Army under General Andrew Pickens by William Little, deceased, the father of the petitioner. The petitioner did not seek reimbursement for the services of his father.]

South Carolina Abbeville District} Before me appeared John McCord² who being duly sworn deposeth and saith that he this deponent was acquainted with William Little formally of Abbeville District the father of James Little and knows that William Little Served as a Soldier under Genl. Pickens [Andrew Pickens] who was a Captain at that time in draton [sic, William Henry Drayton's]³ campaign and that the said Little fought⁴ under Williamson [Andrew Williamson] at Cambridge of this district. That afterwards the said Little purchased a set of Mills on Calhoun's Creek, and deponent knows that the aforesaid Little did furnish the Soldiers of this State with Corn Meal, Flour, and Pork and that he this deponent saw two waggons loading with

Thanks to C. Leon Harris for identifying Drayton as the likely man referred to by the affiant. In early August 1775, William Henry Drayton and others were sent by the Council of Safety to the upper part of South Carolina to induce the Tories there to sign the Association swearing allegiance to the cause of Liberty. Drayton was accompanied by Oliver Hart, a Baptist minister, Joseph Kershaw, a prominent backcountry merchant, planter, legislator and militia Colonel, Richard Richardson another prominent militia officer and the Reverend William Tennent. Both Tennent and Hart kept Diaries of their journey to the South Carolina backcountry, see R. W.
