Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

John Martain [sic] made Oath that in the Battle of Tarlington's [Banastre Tarleton's] Defeat [also known as the battle at the Cowpens]² on the 17th of January 1781 he had the Misfortune to be very badly wounded, and that Situation he was Removed for Safety into Macklingburgh [Mecklenburg] County in North Carolina, where he lay under Cure the above mentioned horse, his right & Property was Left with him where he Lay under Cure, that he had not money to Buy forage for his said horse & that about the Last of March where he lay, in Maclingburgh as Aforesaid, his Said horse Died, as he thinks for want of forage & Care & that he never Received any pay for the said horse
