Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' or 'undeciphered' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention. Researchers should not rely solely on the transcripts but should review the originals for themselves. These transcripts are intended as an aid to research, not to be used in lieu thereof.]

## Dear Sir

At the request of the bearer Mr. George Mason I have examined the books in my possession & find that only four years pension has been paid to him by the State therefore one year due, reckoning from the passing of the Resolution of March 1784 to March 1789 as from the last period, the United States has ordered payment to the [paper damaged and text missing], agreeable to which [paper damaged and text missing] as received from the last [paper damaged and text missing] A. Hall; two years from March 89 to March 91 as by a Letter I received from that Gentleman immediately after the said payment on the present case I would not hesitate paying the Years annuity [paper damaged and text missing] not as May be improved on, by deviating from the arrangements agreed upon by us.
