The word 'illegible' or 'indecipherable' appearing in brackets indicates that at the time I made the transcription, I was unable to decipher the word or phrase in question. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading skills fail to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call material errors or omissions to my attention.]



## James Abrams' Revolutionary War Service

This is a copy of the stub entry indent record indicating that James Abrams was with Col. Andersons' Militia as early as 1781 in South Carolina. It shows his claim for provisions, forage and three tours of militia duty. Beginning in July 1779 the state of South Carolina issued indents (a form of scrip) when the state was without money to pay men for service or supplies. These Indents were issued in Charleston prior to 1788 at which time Columbia became the Capital



This is a copy of the original grant of land to James Abrams, for his services during the Revolution, from the state government for 121 acres of land located in Ninety-Six District on a small branch of Duncan's Creek, two miles south of Whitmire, S. C. The original is found in the South Carolina Archives, State Grants, Volume 13, page 106 and dated June 5th, 1786.



This is a copy of plat showing the James Abrams land grant. It reads, "I have Caused to be Admeasured and laid out unto James Abrams a Tract of Land Containing One hundred and Twenty one Acres Situate in District of Ninety Six, on a small Branch of Duncan's Creek, and hath such Form, Marks, Buttings and Boundings as the above Plat Represents. Certified for the

10th day of August 1785. Ephraim Mitchell"

James Abrams/Abram was a member of Col. James Williams' Little River Regiment and his signature appears on a petition dated 3 September 1779, addressed to the General Assembly in Charlestown, SC, stating his allegiance to the staunch patriot James Williams. Most, if not all, of these men were James Abrams' neighbors and about half are shown on land grant maps of Newberry and Union County, SC. They were granted land for their services in the Revolution - privates and non-commissioned officers were granted 100 acres, lieutenants 200 acres and captains 300 acres. James was granted 121 acres in 1786 for his services. It is unclear why the extra 21 acres were added.
