# Pension application of Lewis Saxon W21791 Sally McNess<sup>1</sup> fn117SC Transcribed by Will Graves revd 6/24/11

[Methodology: Spelling, punctuation and/or grammar have been corrected in some instances for ease of reading and to facilitate searches of the database. Where the meaning is not compromised by adhering to the spelling, punctuation or grammar, no change has been made. Corrections or additional notes have been inserted within brackets or footnotes. Blanks appearing in the transcripts reflect blanks in the original. A bracketed question mark indicates that the word or words preceding it represent(s) a guess by me. Only materials pertinent to the military service of the veteran and to contemporary events have been transcribed. Affidavits that provide additional information on these events are included and genealogical information is abstracted, while standard, 'boilerplate' affidavits and attestations related solely to the application, and later nineteenth and twentieth century research requests for information have been omitted. I use speech recognition software to make all my transcriptions. Such software misinterprets my southern accent with unfortunate regularity and my poor proofreading fails to catch all misinterpretations. Also, dates or numbers which the software treats as numerals rather than words are not corrected: for example, the software transcribes "the eighth of June one thousand eighty six" as "the 8th of June 1786." Please call errors or omissions to my attention.]

#### The State of South Carolina Laurens district: SS

On this 3rd day of January in the year of our Lord 1845 personally appeared before the Judge of the court of Ordinary for the District of Laurens Sally McNess a resident of the State of South Carolina in the District of Laurens, aged seventy-six years who being first duly sworn, according to law doth on her oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the benefits of the provision made by the acts of Congress passed July 7th, 1838, and the 23rd of August 1842, granting pensions to widows of persons who served during the revolutionary War. That she is the widow of Lewis Saxon who was a soldier and officer in the war of the Revolution. That from the best information she has as to the services of her deceased husband Lewis Saxon, he was drafted in the service in the year 1778 under Colonel James Williams & Colonel Robert McCrary and then performed 3 months service.

That he was drafted again in 1779 under the above named officers and performed a tour of 3 months service. That he volunteered in 1780, the last of December, under Captain William Harris and Colonel Joseph Hays [Joseph Hayes] and performed service as a private, until sometime in the year 1781, at which time he was appointed a Captain and continued to perform service in such up to the close of the War. That there was a predatory war kept up between the Tories and Whigs in South Carolina, for several months after the treaty of peace between the United States and Great Britain, in which her husband continued to perform service. That she has heard her husband say he was engaged in the Battles of Cowpens, Eutaw Springs, the Siege at Ninety Six, and was taken prisoner at Hayes' Station in Ninety Six District. That he was a resident of Ninety Six District South Carolina at the time he was drafted into service, where he continued to live (or in a part of the same now called Laurens District) to the time of his death. That his services were performed in the State of South Carolina, with the exception of one tour of Service, which she has heard her husband say he performed in the State of North Carolina. That she has no other documentary evidence in support of the claim, than what is here with forwarded to the Department.

That many years ago she saw amongst her husband's papers his commission as a Captain in the Revolutionary War; but that it has since been destroyed or misplaced so that it is now out of her power to produce it. She also declares that she was married to the said Lewis Saxon on the first day of February in the year 1787; that her husband, the aforesaid Lewis Saxon died on the 31<sup>st</sup> day of October 1813; that she was not married to

him prior to his leaving the service, but the marriage took place previous to the first of January 1794 Viz.: at the time above stated. She further declares that after the death of her husband the aforesaid she was married to Robert McNess on the \_\_ day of April in the year 1816; that he died on the seventh day of January 1840; and that she is still a widow. And that she said Sally McNess is a credible person.

In testimony whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal of the court this the 3rd day of January in the year of our Lord 1845.

The State of South Carolina, Lawrence District

Before the Subscriber a Magistrate in and for the District aforesaid, and duly authorized by the laws of the State to administer oaths, personally appeared Joseph Griffin<sup>2</sup> a revolutionary Pensioner of the United States and being duly Sworn makes oath that he was well acquainted with Lewis Saxon of Laurens District (formally called Ninety Six District, South Carolina). That the said Lewis Saxon was a Soldier and officer in the revolutionary war – was drafted into service in the year 1778, commanded by Colonel James Williams & Col. Robert McCrary [sic, Robert McCreery] and performed a three months service in the upper & middle part of the State. That he was drafted again in 1779 commanded by Colonels Williams & McCreery, and performed a three months tour of service, was in the Battle of Stono, his services were confined to the State of South Carolina.

That he volunteered the last of December 1780 under Captain William Harris, Colonel Joseph Hayes, in Ninety Six District & marched to Grindal's Shoals on Pacolet River, from there to the Cowpens and was there engaged in the Battle. That he performed service mostly in the upper Section of the State, was at the Siege of Ninety Six – and was taken a prisoner at Hayes' Station in Ninety Six District.

That the said Lewis Saxon was appointed a Captain in 1781 (the precise time of the year not now recollected) and continued to act as a Captain up to the close of the war. This deponent & the said Lewis Saxon belonged to the same Regiment from the time he volunteered in December 1780 up to the close of the War in the year 1783.

Before the Subscriber a Magistrate in and for the District aforesaid and duly authorized by the laws of the State to administer oaths personally appeared Charles Allen<sup>3</sup> a revolutionary pensioner of the United States and being duly sworn makes oath that he was well acquainted with Lewis Saxon of Laurens District (formerly called Ninety Six District South Carolina).

That the said Lewis Saxon was a soldier and officer and the Revolutionary War. This deponent entered the service of the revolution in the month of April in the year 1781, and Knows that the said Lewis Saxon was then in service, commanded by Colonel Williams<sup>4</sup> & Major William Mulwee [sic, William Milwee]<sup>5</sup> and that the said Lewis Saxon continued to perform Service up to the close of the war.

Sworn to and subscribed this third day of January 1845 before me.

acquainted with Lewis Saxon of Lawrence District South Carolina and were married Sally Allen – That the said Lewis Saxon was a soldier and officer of the revolutionary We were; that he acted as a Captain in service for at least two years, don't know how long he was in service before his promotion.

Before the Subscriber a Magistrate in and for the District aforesaid and duly authorized by the laws of the State to administer oaths personally appeared William Blakely, <sup>7</sup> a Revolutionary pensioner of the United States, and being first duly sworn makes oath that he was well acquainted with Lewis Saxon of Ninety Six District, South Carolina, that the said Lewis Saxon was a soldier & officer in the revolutionary war; that this deponent & the said Lewis Saxon were together at the Battle of Stono, and were taken prisoner at Hayes Station in Ninety Six District. That the said Lewis Saxon was appointed a Captain in 1781 & performed service as such up to the close of the war.

[Veteran's widow was pensioned at the rate of \$230 per annum commencing March 4th, 1848, for the service of her former husband as a Captain in the South Carolina militia.]
